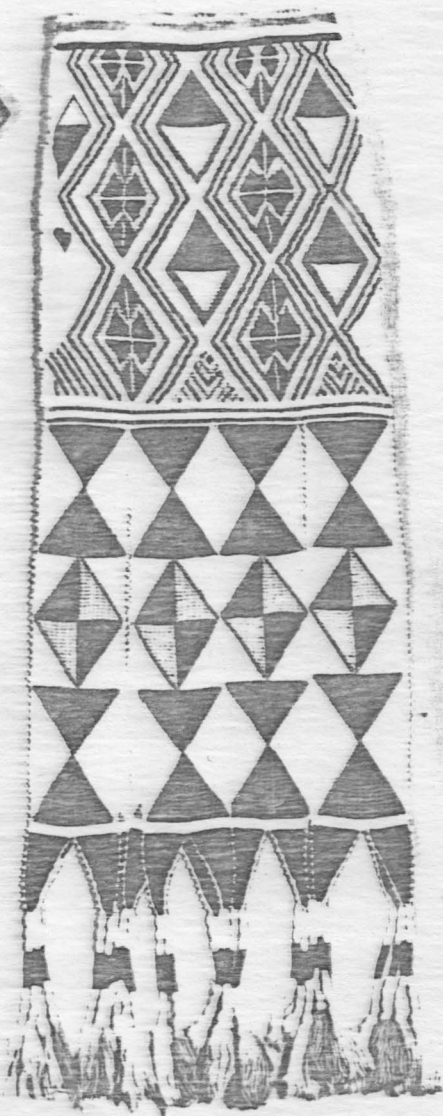
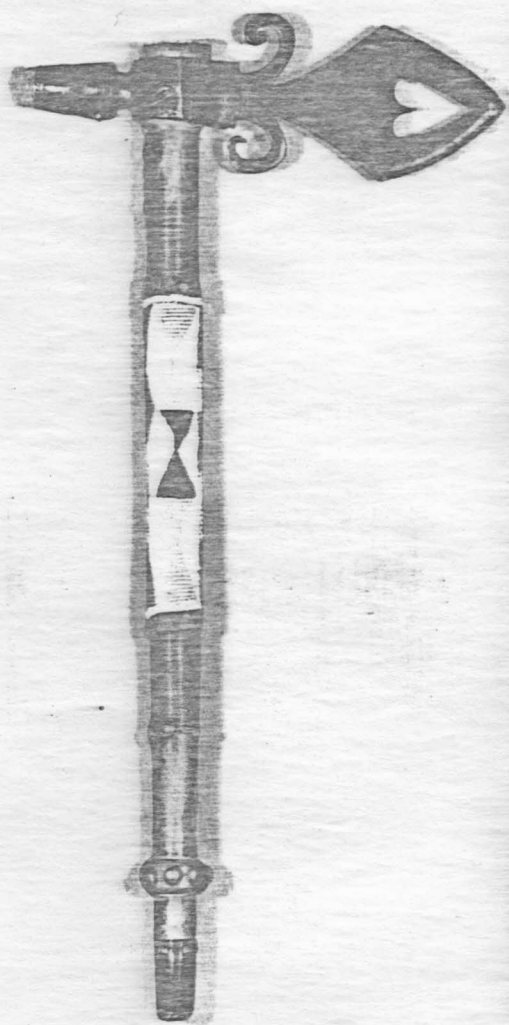

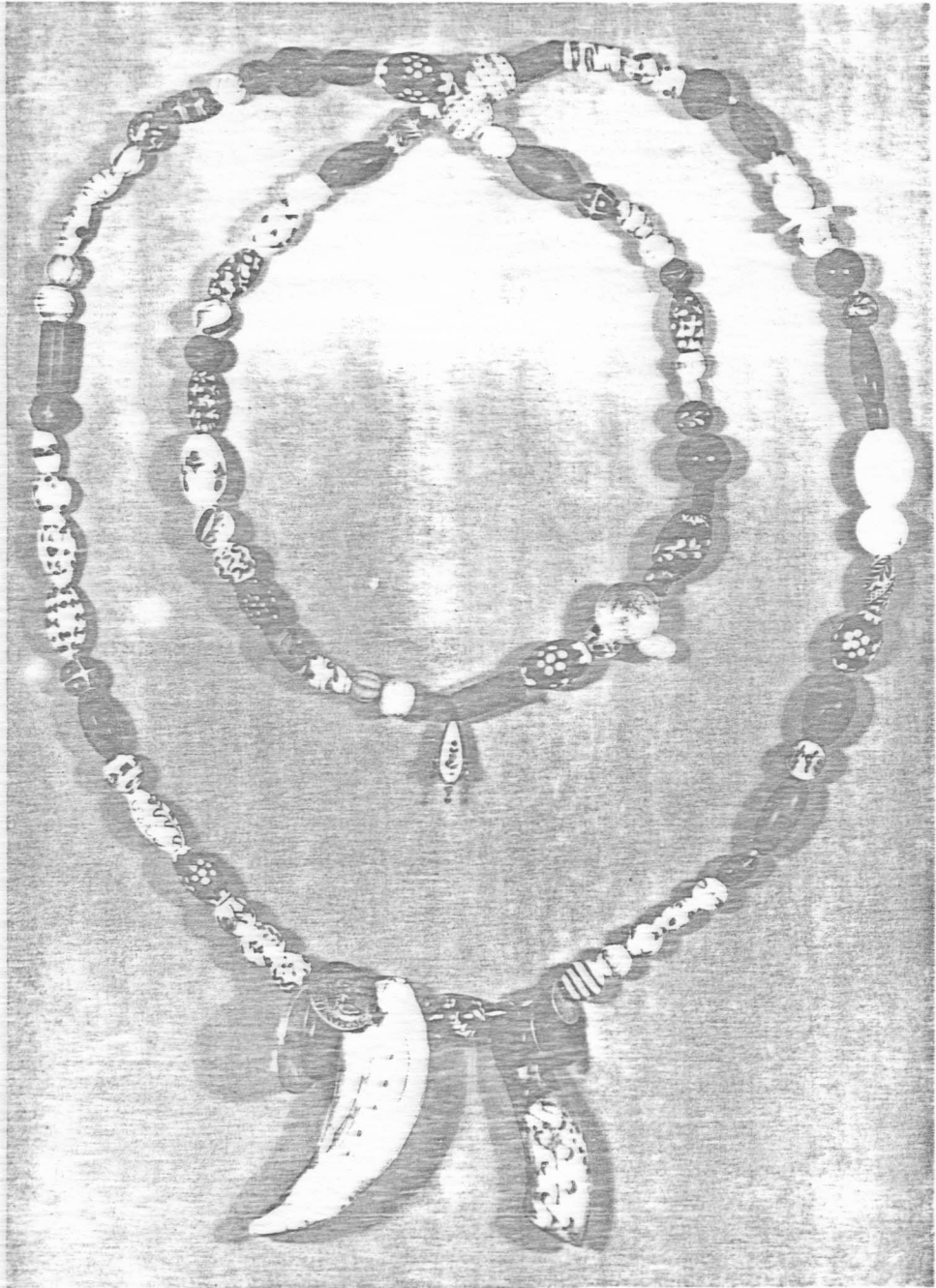
TOMAHAWK PIPE AND TOBACCO POUCH

NOW IN THE POSSESSION OF THE OREGON HISTORICAL SOCIETY, PORTLAND, OREGON

This is the type of "Peace pipe" used in the early days by the Hudson's Bay Company as a token of friendship. It was owned by Tom-At-las, the Indian who killed Dr. Marcus Whitman in the massacre of 1847.

The articles are now in the possession of the Oregon Historical Society, Portland.

They were photographed direct from the original by the four color process. Reduced three and one-half diameters.



INDIAN BEADS AND OTHER ORNAMENTS

Photographed direct by four-color process—one-half size. People of many races have mingled and trafficked for long years and, on the shores of the great Columbia, Oriental beads were brought in ships for the purpose of barter and exchange by fur traders. This collection was made in the vicinity of Menalouse Island, the Island of the Dead, not far from The Dalles, Oregon. They are known as Hudson's Bay beads.
