## ABSTRACT

Pine Fort, located on the Assiniboine River in south western
Manitoba Canada, is an 18th century fur trading fort operated by the
North West Company. The present research involves identification and
quantification of archaeological material in order to isolate and
distinguish some of the wide range of socio-economic activities that
occurred at this Site. This is carried out by first determining the
function (or functions) that the artifacts served in the context of
an 18th century frontier fur trade settlement, and then plotting the
spatial distribution of these activity-specific artifacts in order
to determine areas of activity. With the determination of activity
areas, a series of hypotheses are derived and tested in order to outline
and describe some of the social implications that underly the spatial
distribution of artifacts. Special areas of concern include the
concept of work space, sexual division of labor and refuse disposal
patterns.




Plate I Trade Items i - trade seed beads
