if it was still in existence when he arrived six to eight years later. Regardless of this suspicion, Faribault's occupation of this site is clearly supported by the analysis of the artifacts. In the absence of any contradictory evidence, it is reasonable to assume that the "cairns" and associated finds may be attributed to Jean Baptiste Faribault's occupation of Pike Island.
